# NOTES FROM PASTOR ALEX WOULD YOU, COULD YOU IN A TREE? FRESH EXPRESSIONS OF THE GOSPEL

Campus ministry taught me a lot about third places. Back in the Aughts when I was director of the Wesley Foundation at UVA, I didn't know to call them 'third places.' But we did a whole lot of ministry in those spaces that weren't 'home' or 'work/class' space. It even got me to worship in a tree!

Sociologists talk about third places as vital to building communities. Parks, gyms, coffee houses, and fast-food restaurants all provide space for people to meet on different turf than their homes and work places. As they do, new things can happen.

This is particularly important for churches to understand since we live in a society in which the majority of people now do not have significant experiences inside church buildings. For non-churched people, the intimidation factor of crossing the threshold of a church, no matter how welcoming it may be, is high. They are much more likely to express their curiosity if church people are doing their church thing in other places.

This is what I learned in campus ministry. We had a regular Sunday night worship service and many of our regulars were involved in church life. But through the week I met students over lunch at Newcomb Hall, at late-night Bible studies at the coffee shop, and even at midday pop-up worship that could take place anywhere, including trees like the big-limbed beauty in the courtyard of the Engineering School. Our current Wesley Foundation director at UVA, the Rev. Devon Earle, is still doing creative things with students in new places. And here at Charlottesville First we're branching out to do hymn sings at pubs, fellowship while hiking the trails, spiritual formation at the salad spot, and vision sessions over tacos.

The Fresh Expressions movement, which began in Great Britain and has now grown to many US locales has embraced this concept. According to the promoters, Fresh Expressions are "a form of church for our changing culture established primarily for the benefit of people who are not yet part of any church." A church that decides to support a Fresh Expression commits to doing small-scale ministry within an "affinity group" - a group of people who share a common interest, hobby, or meeting place.

If you know a place (or a tree) or a group of people where you'd like to try a new kind of ministry, talk to me or one of our great staff members. And let's meet God out in this big, beautiful world among the people God loves!

# COMPOSTING, RECYCLING & TRASH AT CFUMC

Composting is the process of returning organic materials to soil or mulch through natural decomposition. Sounds simple doesn't it? Everything that we compost returns to a usable form while producing CO2. If we send these same things to the landfill, they take up space in a sealed environment - "forever" - while producing harmful methane gas.



At CFUMC we are trying to compost as much as we possibly can. The church is buying compostable products such as plates, napkins, silverware, cups, glasses & bags. We have green compostable bags to put these items in. So, if you are eating in the church, please look for a green composting bin for your leftover food (including bones), cup, plate, napkin & even your fork or spoon. Unfortunately, some things are still trash & have to be thrown away, such as a plastic coffee stirrers. It's very important that trash is not combined with the compost. No one wants to dig through to separate out the trash.

If you do not feel comfortable drinking directly from the water fountain, we have provided compostable cups & a green can to put your cup in after you're done.

Generally, the compost is brought to the McIntire Recycling Center (MRC). The MRC currently sends the composting to a local commercial composting facility in Waverly, Virginia.

Recycling is also done at CFUMC (look for blue bins or cans). We recycle cardboard, various types of paper (like bulletins), some plastics (like water bottles), and various metals (like aluminum cans). This is often done after the Bread and Blessings meal on Mondays. The recycling is also brought to the McIntire Recycling Center. Again, some things still have to be thrown away. For example, aluminum pans with stuck on food have to be thrown out.

Pizza boxes are an issue. If they are relatively clean, they can be recycled. If they are not clean, they can be composted.

#### How can you help?

- Look for green composting cans for compostable items.
- Look for blue bins or cans for recycled items.
- If there is no can or bin, please ask for one. There are always some in the kitchen, if you can go get one.
- If you are in charge of any type of food offering, make sure you put out a green composting can, blue recycling bin & a trash can.
- ◊ Consider composting & recycling at home.

#### WELCOME TO ROBERT LEWIS OUR NEW COMMUNICATIONS AND IT DIRECTOR!



Robert Lewis has been fascinated by the ways technology can help share the Gospel since he was ten years old. The son of a United Methodist pastor, he finally convinced his parents let him set up their first church computer in 1985. By age fourteen, he was working with Virginia United Methodist Communications to film Annual Conference and then distribute audio and video tapes of Conference worship and bible studies. He helped design the first Virginia Conference website and launch the "Sunday

Advocate," an e-mailed bulletin insert that brought Conference-wide news and mission stories to congregations each week.

Robert studied physics at Randolph-Macon College, where he met his first wife, Rachel. Together, they attended Duke Divinity School and served churches in South Boston and Buckingham County. In 2003, Robert and Rachel moved to Sheffield, England to serve British Methodist Churches, and they were ordained in the Methodist Church of Great Britain in 2005. In 2012, they returned to Virginia and Robert was appointed pastor of Hinton Avenue UMC in Charlottesville. Rachel died of breast cancer in 2016, but her ministry among those with intellectual disabilities helped shape the vision for developing safe, affordable, supportive housing at Hinton Avenue. The effort to build Rachel's Haven continues to be underway.

In April 2020, Robert married Bex Simmerman. Due to the pandemic, no one was invited. Bex also grew up in a parsonage, but she agreed to go out with Robert anyway. For six years, Bex served as a missionary in Sudan and was part of the Holston Conference's Muslim Outreach Team. After returning to the States, she earned an MA in Conflict Transformation at Eastern Mennonite University. Together, Bex and Robert have a dog, Sassy, and four cats: Sketti, Kala, Shuri, and Steve. (Sketti is the only one who likes them, but it took four cats to find a good one.) When she is not caring for children with special needs, Bex loves photography, crafting, treasure hunting in thrift stores, and cat videos.

Since taking a leave of absence from pastoral ministry, Robert has become Chaplain and Bereavement Support Coordinator with Hill and Wood Funeral Home. He now loves also being part of Charlottesville First UMC as Communications and Technology Coordinator. When not working on a computer, he's often taking one apart. Otherwise, you'll find him snapping photos, watching science fiction, reading comic books, or taking a nap with his wife and cats.
